Once upon a time, so all good stories begin, but to be specific it was the fall of 1928, a new batch of kiddies was crammed into the "Old Mill of Learning" at Carlisle for a twelve year grind that would or should turn out a finished product of marvelous wisdom. Incidentally that was the year the school board ordered everything loose nailed down, and a fresh supply of paddles was purchased. Mis Norma Wessels was the lucky teacher who initiated us infant prodigies to the mysteries of "'readin', 'ritin', and 'rithmetic." Of the original class of twenty there are but six who have came all the way together—Faye the other members dropped out, new ones came to take their places to help us heckle the

The chapters of our sage were counted off as quickly as a referee counts out a Joe Louis' challenger and the teachers, "Oh Noble Martyrs of Public Education", we mention here as milestones of our progress.

Who of us will ever forget the night we were graduated from the eighth grade? Our play, "Where's Grandma?", the graduation exercises, the girls white dresses, yellow roses for all, and Mr. Prall's presentation of the diplomas "just like high school".

1936 -- Freshman Year

This was the year that the Carlisle public school fittingly celebrated the advent of the class of '40 to high school by dedicating the splendid new gymnasium September 7, 1936 (That ain't the way I heard it, Johnny!) Mr. Homer Baker, supt., Miss Bernice Ware, Miss Beatrice Watland, and Harry Kruchten were the faculty. Mr. Kruchten was guardian angel to twenty-two of us that year and we enjoyed many class parties, in the "gym", coasting on Pralls hill, weinner roasts in the park. The big affair of the Freshie year was on May 14, 1937 when our class went to Des Moines for a picnic supper and a show. The faculty for our sophomore year was composed of Mr. M. C. Hickman, supt., Mr. Sherman, principal and coach, Miss Beatrice Watland, and Bernice Ware. Miss Ware was our class sponsor. One of the high lights of this year was the play, "The Neighbors" given by the Home Economics class, and the high school orchestra went to Iowa City to the State Music Contest.

1938 -- Junior Year

This year the school board added another member to the faculty, Miss Lois Hostetter. No doubt it was necessary so the teachers could "keep up" with the ambitious junior students, don't you think, or do you? Mr.(and Mrs.) Sherman were chaperons this year at our usual class parties. (Remember the night we went roller skating?) The Junior class play "Aunt Cindy Cleans Up" provided lots of fun at rehearsals but some embarassing moments on the fatal night. The high school orchestra went to Iowa City for the State Music Contest on May 4, 5, 6, 1939. The big moment of the year, however, was the Junior-Senior banquet held at Younkers Tea Room, May 1, 1939.

1939--1940--Senior Year

At last we are one of those awe inspiring things, a Senior. We are back for a last whirl in the old mill. Miss Lyla Olson, Miss Genevieve Lillie, Mr. Howard Dugan, new faculty members, fervently agree with Mr. Hickman and Miss Ware that it won't be long now until we shall be 16 "finished products of marvelous wisdom." We've murdered the King's English and slain the green eyed dragon of assignments. A few more all too short weeks for a Senior play, Junior-Senior banquet, sneak day, and the commencement week activities. Then we shall have reached the last chapter in the book "Twelve Years in a Class Room." Thus the story will end to begin anew leaving our thumb prints and dog ears on the pages of time.
