Class History

In the fall of 1930, nine quivering, shivering little brats were impounded in the basement of C. H. S. The skeptical teachers were entrusted with the task of pounding some knowledge in our thick skulls. This future class of 1942 consisted of Allen Aldridge, Wesley Hargis, Frances Foulke, Lillie Lewis, Le Roy Pegram, James Thomas, James Wilt, Wilma Graham, and Lorraine Bartholomew.

In the third grade this struggling group was reenforced by Glenn Barr and Virginia Zook. In the fourth grade we finally mastered our alphabet and began to work on the Times-Tables. In the fifth grade Bill Justus joined the ranks and immediately captured the teacher's heart, as he has continued to through the years.

When we started our Freshman year in 1938 we were joined by Kenneth Miller, Derald Haugh, Lorine McDaniel, Evelyn Bertrand, Lorraine Bartholomew who had been absent during the eighth grade, and Wilma Graham and Betty Killen, who had been absent during the seventh and eighth grades.

In our Freshman year we were persecuted by ruthless upperclassmen and scornful teachers. Our frail minds struggled desperately with General Science, English, Home-Ec. I, Manual training and Algebra. None of us ever did learn to speak Algebra.

During our Sophomore year our sponsor was Mr. Dugan who chaperoned our class parties and gave us much fatherly advice. This year we successfully mastered English II, Agriculture, Home-Ec. II, World History and Geometry.

During our Junior year we enjoyed more freedom as the teachers began to have confidence and allowed us more privileges. We successfully produced our Class Play, "Lena Rivers" under the direction of Miss Smiley. In the spring we had our Junior-Senior Banquet which gave us all a good excuse to stay out later than usual. We were all saddened at the loss of our classmate of many years, Frances Foulke, who died in May, 1941.

In September, 1941, we returned to C. H. S. to be kings (and Queens) of the roost. We took one last grab at knowledge and prepared to take our stand among the immortal alumni of Carlisle High School. In the spring of 1942 we donned our caps and gowns and received our Honorable Discharge, signified by the customary sheepskin. Our graduation was a blow to the teachers who had grown fond of all of us and hated to see us leave.

The basketball season at Carlisle High school opened Friday night as Carlisle split a dual program with St. Marys. The girls lost 22-13, with the boys holding up the honor of Carlisle by winning 33-16.

The girls game showed lots of action as Shaft and Houseman paced St. Marys scoring attack with nine points each, while Henson, clever guard, kept the Carlisle sharp shooters at bay. Cole with six points led Carlisle's attack while Lewis and Hull stood out on defense.

Carlisle, Dec. 22.—Carlisle continued their winning streak last week on the home court, winning their first double-header of the year as they met Urbandale. The girls won their initial game 30-23, while the boys took a 38-29 decision from the Des Moines crew.

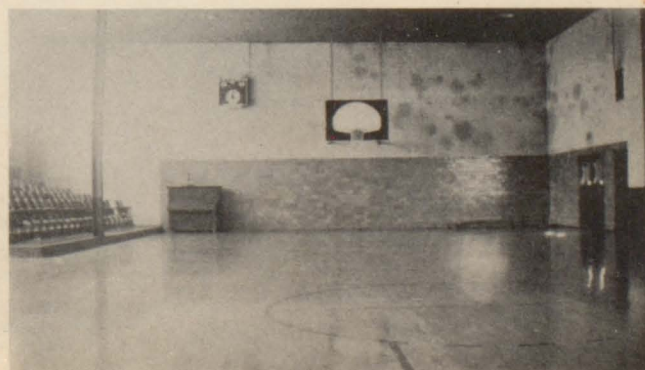
The girls, sparked by Phyllis Bartholomew, game captain, took the lead in the first quarter, were ahead 16-13 at halftime, and went on to win without any serious trouble. Scoring honors for the evening went to freshman Pat Crouse, who made her first high school appearance less than a week ago. P. Boys Win; Girls Tie Games With Beech

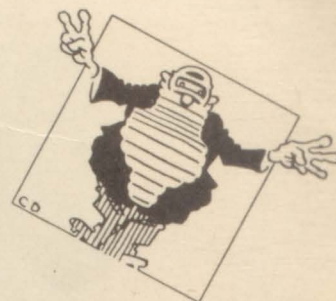
The Carlisle High School boys and girls teams went to Beech Tuesday evening, Feb. 24th, for two basketball games which proved quite interesting.
