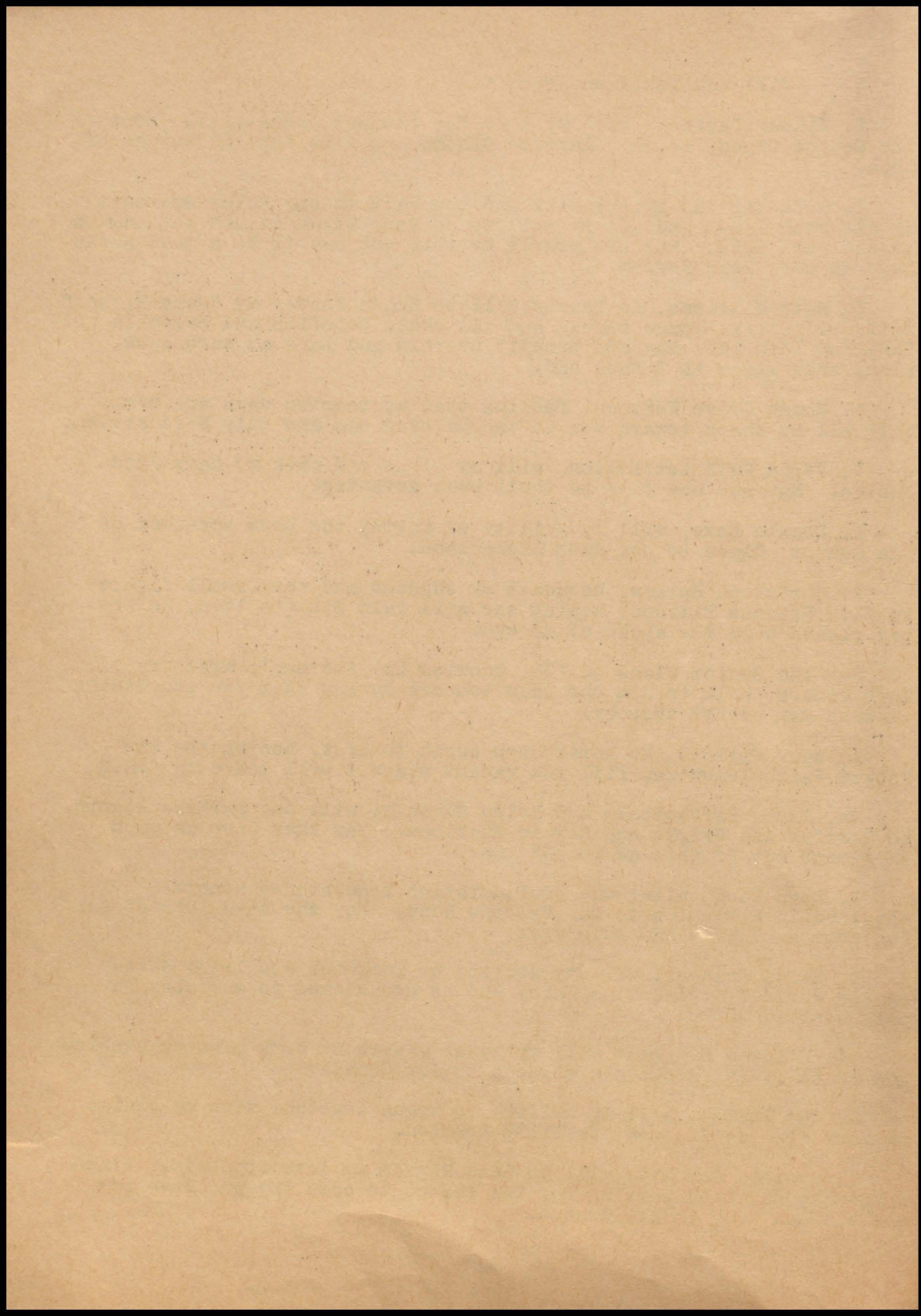
I, Dean Zook, after due consideration bequeath my honors obtained in athletics to one Valorys Munn. May she have lots of use for them as I have had this year.

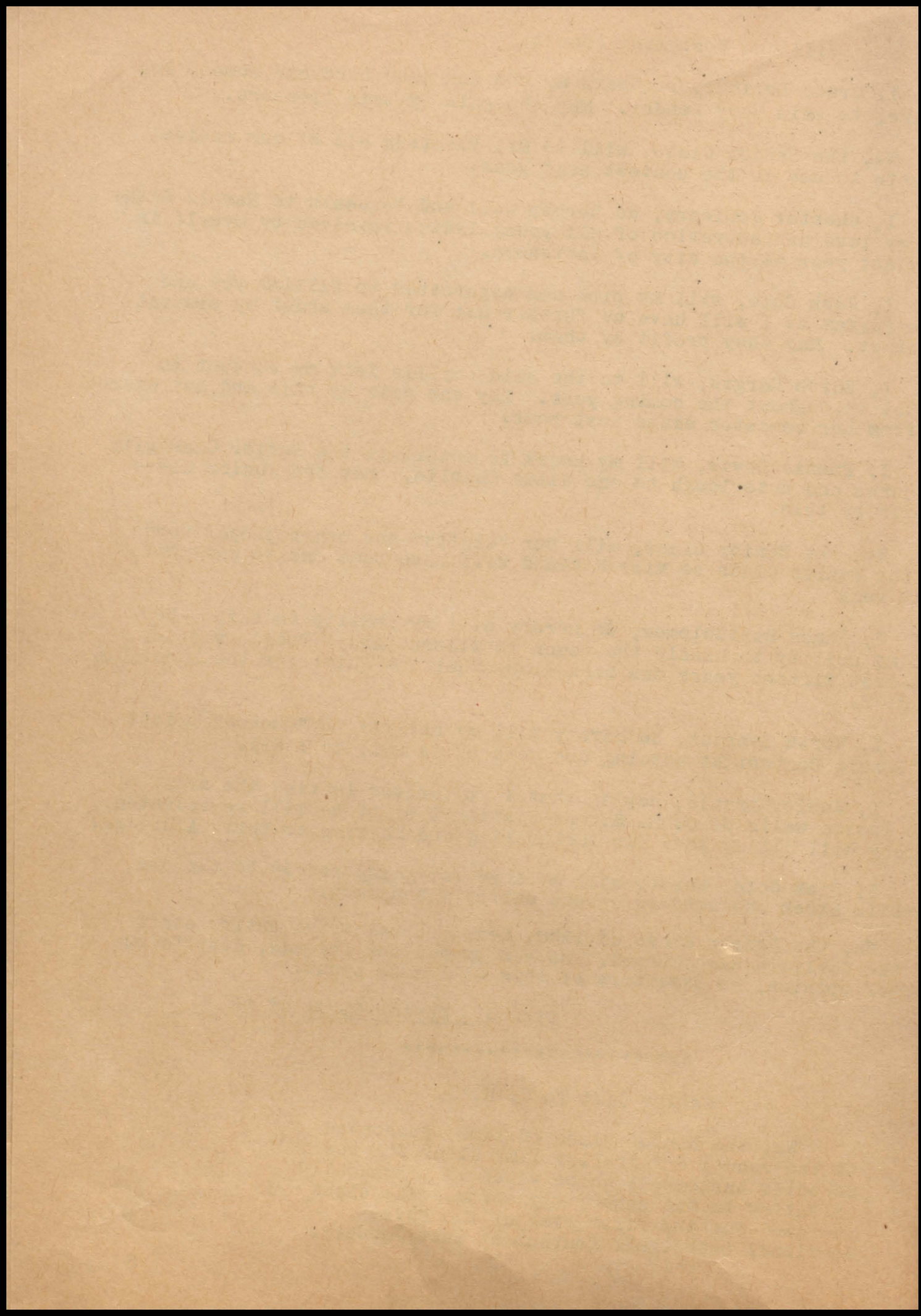
I, Jack Cole, hereby will my love for going steady to the one Phyllis Black who wanders around entirely too much.

Arriving in Denver we stop for a meal at a Cafe and find Bonnie Davis and Mildred Ruggles as waitresses who had been working there several years.

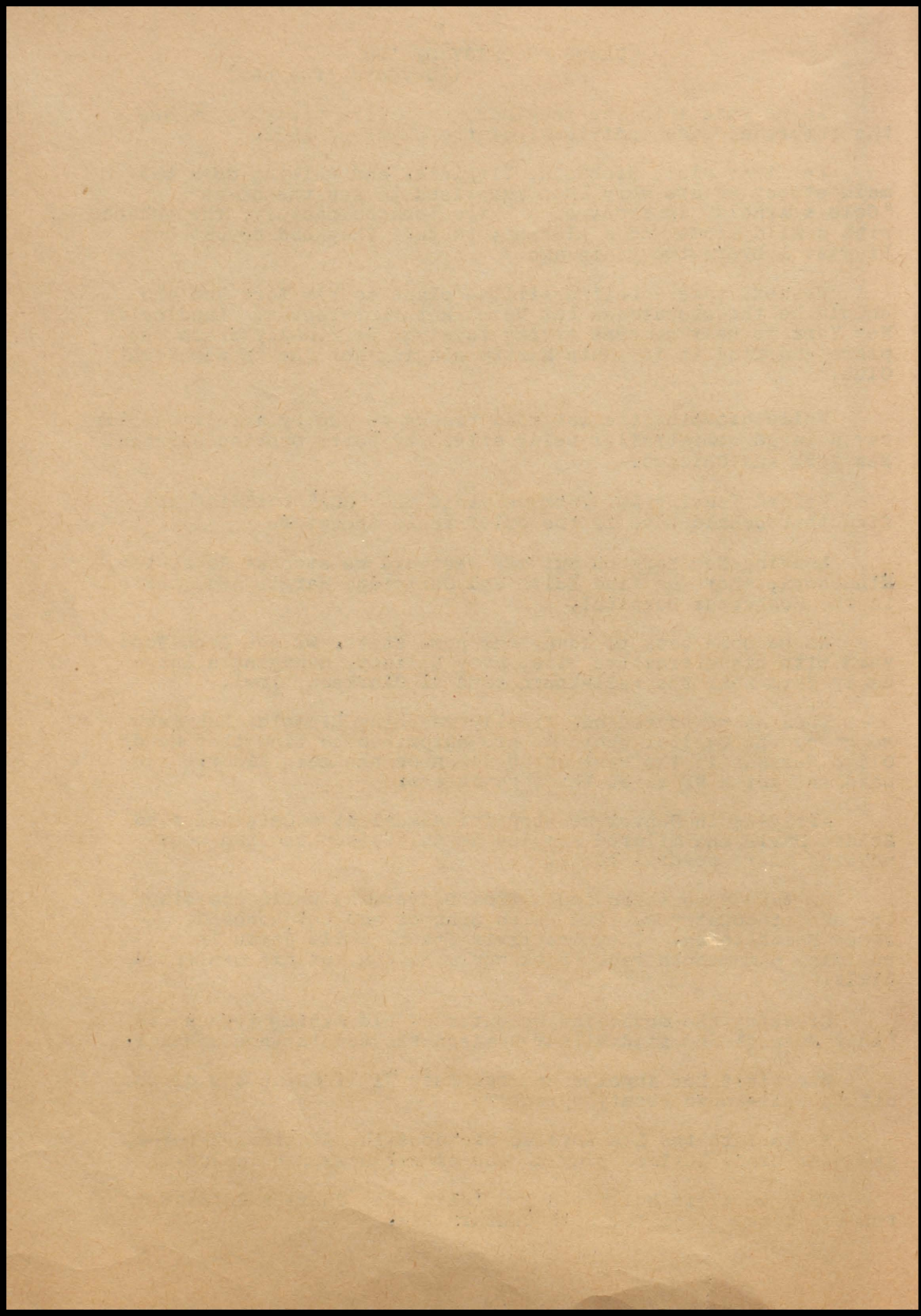

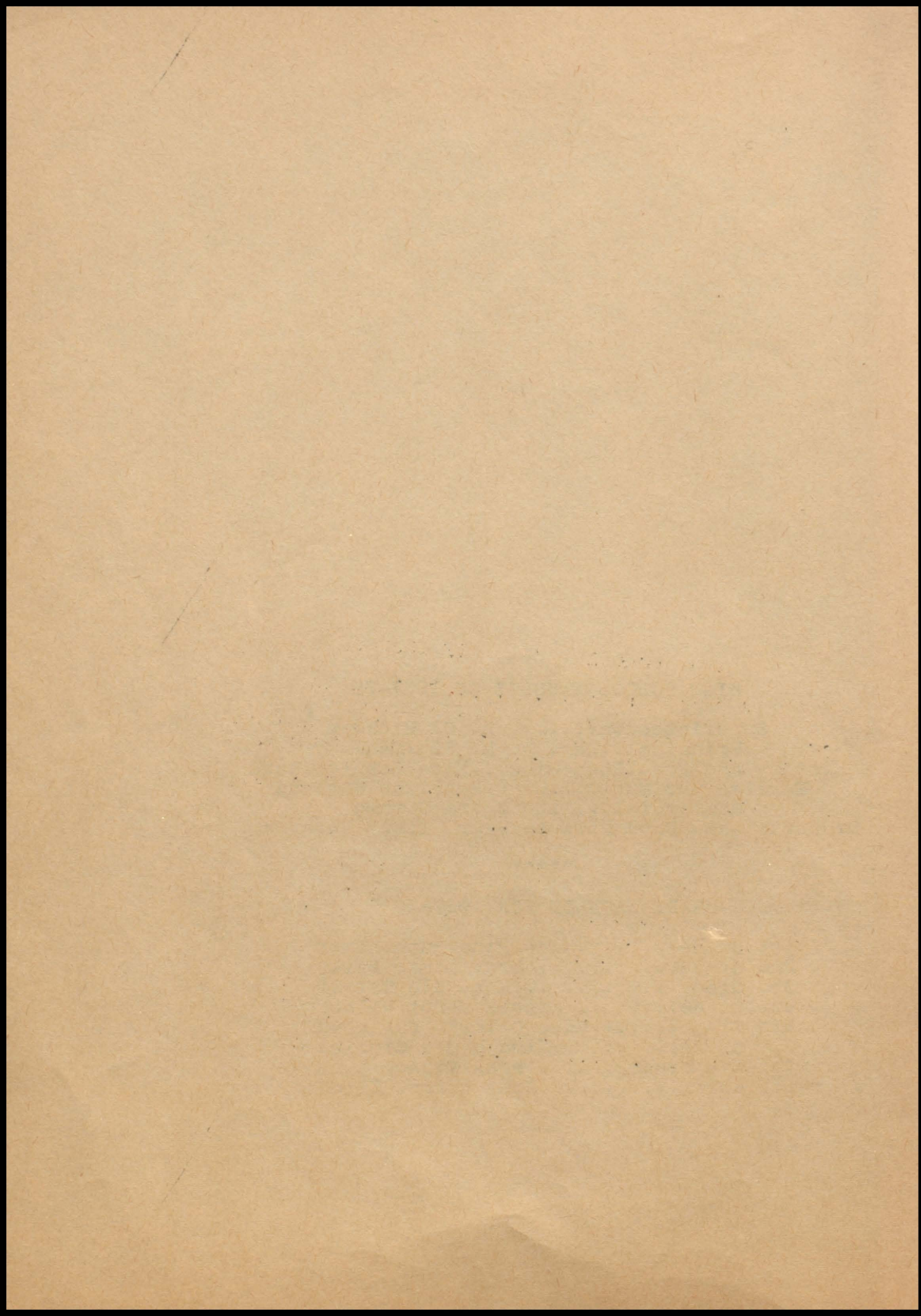
