The following people dropped out during that year: Elton Bisho Roy Hubbs, Leroy Hanson.





- I, Charles Corratt, will to Gene Pegram my love for Bessie since I know he has been waiting for the chance to care for and love her as he often does in his dreams.



Arriving in Denver we stop for a meal at a Cafe and find Bonnie Davis and Mildred Ruggles as waitresses who had been working there several years.







I am sorry to see you leave. I hope most of you will see the need for further education and I sincerely wish you happiness in whatever you may take up.


