
In the first year for the Little Four Conference, the Carlisle girls played only four games. These four games all resulted in victories for us, and we were declared the Conference winners. After the final game with Milo on our home floor, we were awarded the Conference Championship Trophy. The Milo team was runner-up, having won two games and lost two, while the Pleasantville girls lost all four games.

In the County Tournament, we were able to defeat Norwalk in the finals, after having lost to them twice during the regular season. Last year, Norwalk defeated Carlisle in the final game. Liberty Center, Hartford, and Springhill were defeated on successive days to earn our way to the finals.

In the Sectional Tournament held on our home floor, very little difficulty was encountered in defeating Milo, Runnells, and Beech, thus, winning our way into the District Tournament, played at Colfax. In this tournament we met Van Cleve and, after a good start, we proceeded to fold up, and lost the game by a score of 37 to 27.





As we write this summary of our Band activities for the year, we are in the midst of preparation for our Spring County Festival. The numbers for the massed band were selected by Mr. Versteeg and have required a lot of hard work. Our High School Band includes thirty-four members, and this year's group is the best in balance and performance in ten years, and is far above the average for schools our size.

Due to lack of transportation, the Band made but two out-of-town appearances. One trip was to the Veterans Hospital at Knoxville, and one appearance at Hartford on Memorial Day. They also played for the Legion Observance of July 4th. It has been rumored that there will be summer concerts.

Two soloists have decided to enter the state contests this year: Miss Miriam Prall, who will play the difficult Baritone solo, "Bride of the Waves," by Herbert Clark, and Roland Nickle, who will play the Trumpet solo, "The Commodore Polka", by W. Paris Chambers. Two Vocal soloists have appeared with our band this year--Miss Kathleen Overton and Miss Dora Corum--both sang at our Fall concert.

Our Junior Band includes twenty-four members and have made fine progress. They rehearse before school on Monday and Tuesday and have carried out this schedule throughout the year.

The Bands gave an early concert last Fall and will appear again locally with the Vocal Group on Monday April 2, 1945. They will give the entire Festival Program.

Mr. Russell Harvey, Director of Band and orchestral instruments, American Conservatory of Music, Chicago, Conductor De La Salle High School Bands--Chicago, Composer and arranger for symphonic orchestras and bands, will return to us for a second year as Conductor of Warren County Massed Bands. Those that played last year know what he can accomplish.

The vocal groups of the high school and grades, under the direction of Mrs. Helen Cheesman, presented a Christmas Candlelight service in the school auditorium, Dec, 18. Selections from the more popular Christmas carols were presented as solos and group numbers. The vocal groups will also participate in the Spring Festival.
