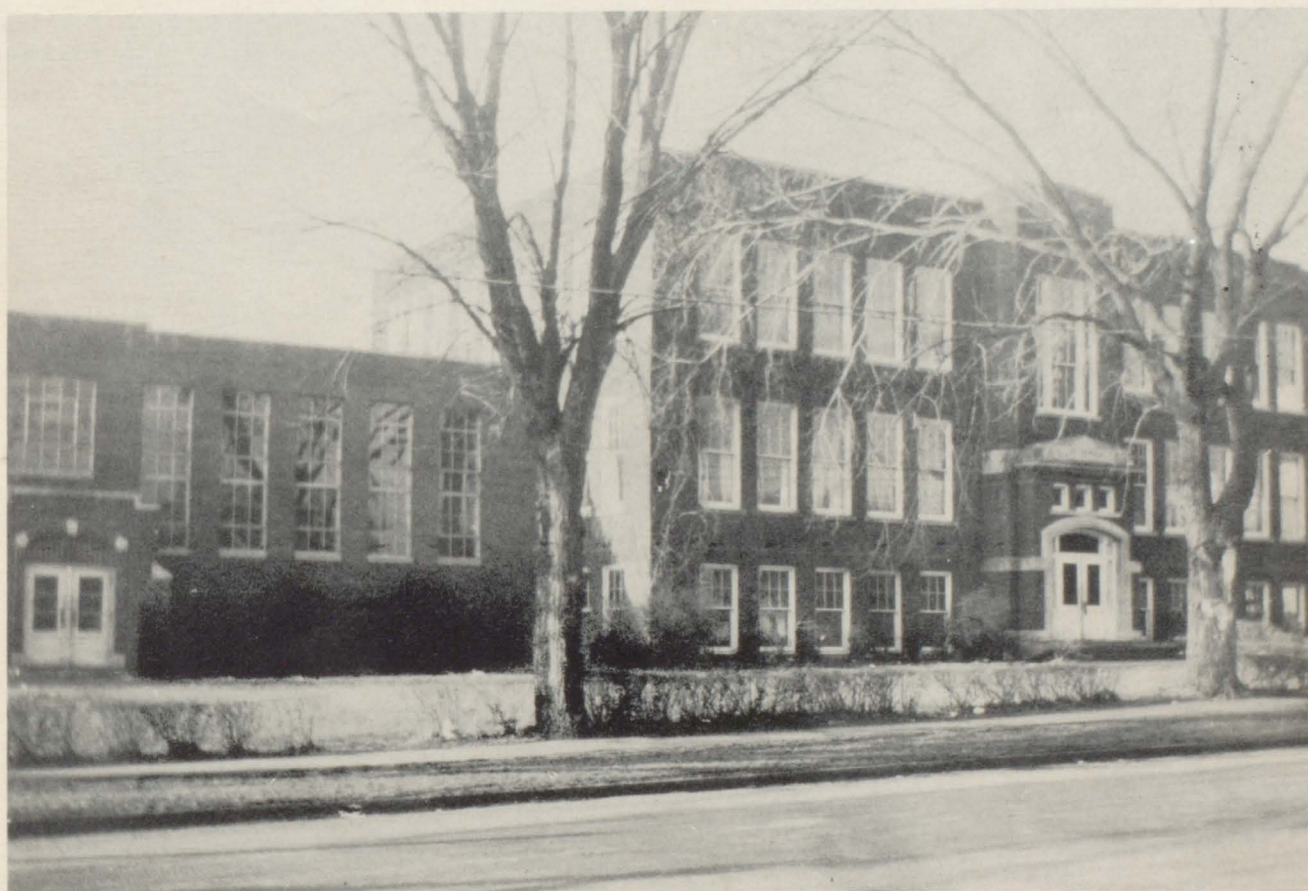

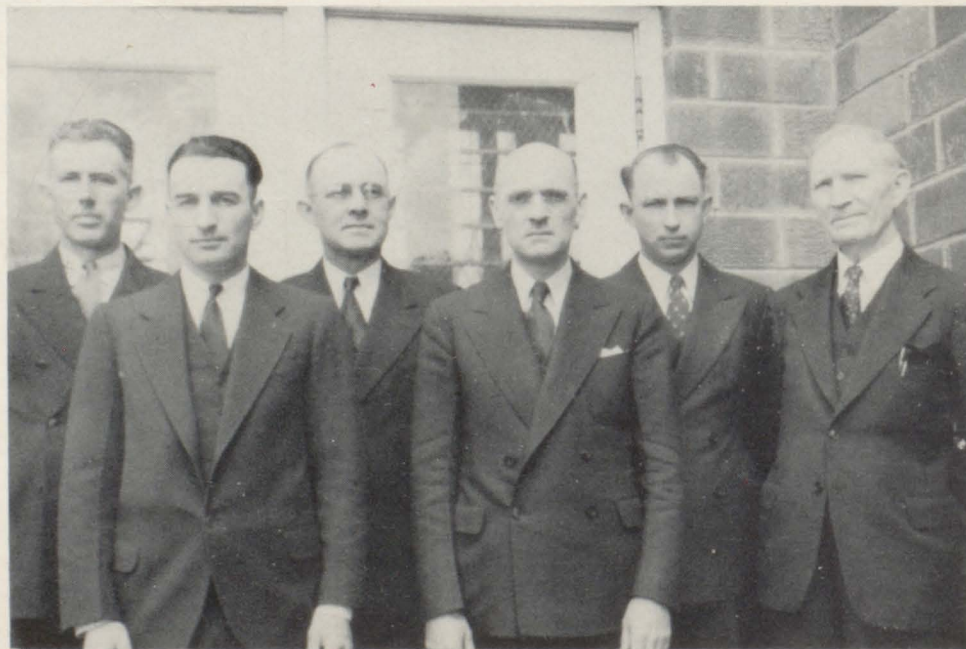

CLASS OF '39



September--1927. Twelve loving mothers escorted their wee ones to school for the first time bemoaning the fact that apron strings could no longer bind their little ones to them. September--1935. The ringing of the school bell found these same twelve, with seven more of the present class, flocking to the doors with their higher learning. Why is it that though such sights bring pleasure, Commencement night itself brings a touch of sadness, and perhaps----a few tears?
