

1999 – the Founding of the Carlisle High School Hall of Fame, Carlisle, Iowa

Faye Epps Sours Buck was born July 3, 1903 next to the oldest of eight children born to Albert and Bertha Epps. She had four sisters and three brothers. She was born in Summerset, Iowa and went to grade school at Greencastle and Scotch Ridge country schools. After graduating from Carlisle High School in **1921**, her post graduate educations included attending the Des Moines University and Drake University. She taught school a total of sixteen years at Island, Old Avon and Sandridge country schools. Then in 1940 she came to Carlisle School District as librarian. Later she served as the secretary to the school board and retired from there in 1961. Her first husband was Owen (Bud) Sours and he died in 1946. In 1961 she married Archie Buck.

Dr. Fred D. Wertman graduated in **1934** and attended Iowa State University for six years to become a Doctor of Veterinary Medicine. He further graduated from the Institute for Association Management. His wife was Jo and their three children all graduated from Carlisle High School also. He volunteered at Iowa Methodist Hospital and Living History Farms. He received an award from staff and management of the Des Moines Marriott Hotel; received a certificate of recognition for high scholarship, outstanding achievement or service to Agriculture Science from Gamma Sigma Delta, honor society of Agriculture – 1984. He became an honorary member of Gamma Chapter of the Society of Phi Zeta in 1974. Received a President's Award, Iowa Veterinary Medical Assn in 1977, was Veterinarian of the Year in 1984. Received the Greater Des Moines Chamber of Commerce Award for leadership as President of the National Board of Veterinary Medical Examiners in 1980. AVMA Award for outstanding service 1979. AVMA Award for service to the Board of Trustees, Professional Liability Insurance in 1965. AVMA Award for service as chairman of the Scientific Program Committee 1975-1979. Stange Award from the College of Veterinary Medicine, ISU for outstanding service to the College of Veterinary Medicine in 1977. Dr. Wertman practiced as a veterinarian in Carlisle for 21 years. Served 18 years on the school board, city council for 3 years, was master of the Masonic Lodge, served on Methodist Church board and Hartford-Carlisle Savings Bank and many more positions in his field.

G.E. "Shag" Grossnickle, passed at age 100, April 25, 2016 in Kirksville, Missouri. And what a legacy this well-spoken, humorous and stately gentleman left as son, brother, husband, father, Papa, public servant, sportsman and raconteur. He was from another era, and he was steady of hand and steady of mind until the end.

Shag was born on June 3, 1915 to parents Albert and Effie Grossnickle in a small house a stone's throw from the river in Carlisle, Iowa. The next to youngest of ten children, he was raised in a family with little materially, but full of joy and good character, which he was known for to the end of his days. His parents were his heroes and were a great influence on him throughout his life, telling him "your word is your bond", and to be honest and do whatever he thought was right.

He graduated from Carlisle High School in **1935**, and was scouted by the Chicago Cubs but decided to stay with his folks a little longer; a wise choice, as things turned out. He eventually ended up attending Kirksville State Teachers College (now Truman State University) on a scholarship to play football, basketball and track, but it was softball that was to be the catalyst for several turning points in Shag's life. He graduated in 1942, but was called into WWII service in April making him one month shy of the May Commencement services. He served part of his tour of duty in the U.S. Navy as the Chief Petty Officer in the physical education program for the Navy Reserve Training Center in Newport R.I. and was later transferred to the Great Lake Naval Base in Chicago.

Later when he returned to Kirksville, he yearned to walk across that stage each year when he saw the

students graduating. Over fifty years later, Shag proudly received his official sheepskin from Truman State president Russell Warren who arranged for him to lead graduation procession in 1993.

And now to softball. His brother Basil gave Shag his nickname in honor of his ability to shag fly balls. In Southeast Iowa and Northeast Missouri Shag was well known for his fast pitch softball. In 1938 a doctor and avid softball coach who had heard of the Carlisle boy over 140 miles away, recruited Shag aggressively for a community softball team in Kirksville MO, offering room and meals at the hospital and a chance to attend college if he would come and play softball in the summers. Shag thought about it and decided he would give it a try, so at twenty-one, he was off to a new life in a new town. And what a good decision it was. He always said softball gave him an education and a wife.

While there, Shag coached and managed a girls' softball team, the Kirksville All-Stars, all the way to the 1941 State Championship. The pretty blue-eyed catcher caught his eye, and after a four year courtship, they were married on April 2, 1942. It was a lifelong love affair that continued for Shag though Sarah died in 2011. He always said they never had a cross word. In 1949, Shag began the first of many years of service to Adair County in various positions. As Sheriff (1949-1957), he would call cornered thieves out by name if he knew them, and often chose to mentor rather than arrest wayward young people, taking them home instead of jail, and telling their parents to take care of it. He said he carried a badge, not a gun--the gun was in the car. He once co-operated with the FBI in a stake-out ending in the apprehension of the murderer of a family of five with a relative in the area. He had a few close calls, and upheld the peace and dignity of the county. He was also County Assessor (1958-1966), and Public Administrator (1973-1980). He helped to organize the Northeast Missouri Peace Officers Association and was its first president.

Shag was an avid sportsman. Growing up on the banks of the Des Moines River, and with a large family to be fed, he learned to hunt and fish, becoming an excellent shot. In fact, at age 98, he killed his limit while duck hunting, missing only one shot. While hunting in southern Missouri in 1960, he saw his first wild turkey and wondered why he didn't see them in Northeast Missouri. Through diligent efforts he brought wild turkeys back to his area. It all started with the delivery of twenty birds, with Shag hand-feeding them at first, but Adair County had its first open season on wild turkeys in 1967. For these efforts in northern Missouri, the Missouri Conservation Commission honored him by bestowing upon him their highest honor in 2005: Master Conservationist. Later, he was recognized for his conservation accomplishments when he was inducted into the 2012 Missouri Sports Hall of Fame, and during the same ceremony his son Gary was recognized for his football talents while playing for the University of Missouri. They were the first father and son to be inducted at the same time.

He thoroughly enjoyed nurturing young people and did so throughout his life. He helped establish the Kirksville Baseball Association in 1953 and has sponsored age 7-8 Little League teams for over fifty years. He was still sponsoring these "Shag's Teams" at the time of his death. He started the DeMolay youth organization of the Masonic Lodge and served as Den Dad. He was a member of the Masonic Lodge and all its bodies, including the Shriners. He served as president of both Greenwood Elementary and Junior High School's PTAs. After his wife's passing, he added to her memorial by creating the Shag and Sarah Grossnickle Scholarship which is awarded to a Truman State University student with a calling to work with the young people at the First Christian Church (Disciples of Christ), where Shag was a longtime member, and served as a deacon and head of the Men's Division.

Shag had the pleasure of being honored many many times in his life. He was a charter member of the Kirksville Baseball Hall of Fame, the Kirksville Lodge of the Loyal Order of the Moose, and the El Kadir Shrine Wildlife Hall of Fame. He joined the Kiwanis Club in 1945 and was a lifelong member. He also was

a member of the Kirksville Jaycees, United Way, YMCA, and the Red Cross. He served as secretary of the Kirksville Chamber of Commerce Committee, and was elected to the Chamber's Hall of Fame in 1992. He served on several Boards of Directors: Grim Smith Hospital and Clinic, Northeast Regional Medical Center, First National Bank/Bank Midwest, and K-REDI (Kirksville Regional Economic Development Inc.) For his work with hospitals, Shag received the Excellence in Governance Award (1998) from the Missouri Hospital Association and was instrumental in the consolidation of the two hospitals in Kirksville which took more than 2 1/2 years to complete. In 2010 he was honored with the Andrew Taylor Still University Spirit award. In 2015 the Kiwanis Club of Kirksville dedicated the Inclusion Park in Kirksville and honored Shag.

Shag stayed connected with his alma maters. He regularly attended his high school class reunions in Iowa and was elected as a charter member of the Carlisle High School Hall of Fame. He also helped to start the Bulldog Booster Club and the Kirksville Quarterback Club of Northeast Missouri State University, now Truman State University. He helped to establish and write the bylaws of the Athletic Hall of Fame of NMSU in 1983, and served on the selection committee until his death. In 1984 he was elected to the NMSU's Hall of Fame.

He enjoyed successful and varied business opportunities in Kirksville over many years. He taught and coached at Kirksville High School, ran the Snappy Service Restaurant, and in 1965 became a partner with Les Orwiler in the Grossnickle-Orwiler Insurance Agency, now Grossnickle Insurance, with son John joining him in 1974. Shag continued to go to the office often until his passing, a familiar fixture in town, always perfectly turned out, sporting one of his many hats.

He was a wonderful and sought-after storyteller who regaled his friends and family with fascinating takes and tales of the old days. His grandchildren and great-grandchildren liked nothing better than to be entertained by Papa Shag. Once he got going, he didn't want to stop, and no one wanted him to. He was that good.

Shag was married to wife Sarah Rose, had two brothers and seven sisters.

Dr. William R. (Jack) Fry Jack was the son of W.C. Fry and had two younger brothers. He graduated in **1939** and married Audrey Thomas in 1940. He received a BS in electrical engineering from ISU in 1943, completed graduate work at George Washington University in Washington D.C., received his PhD in physics from ISU in 1951, then completed an Atomic Energy Postdoctoral Fellow at the University of Chicago in 1952. Dr. Fry has served as a professor of physics from 1952-1998, initiated the experimental High Energy Physics Program at Wisconsin and at Padova and Milan Universities in Italy. He has authored articles in 78 scientific publications in the US and Italian journals. He has served on several national scientific advising committees, has addressed several international scientific conferences, and served many years as consultant to the International Atomic Energy Commission. He began work on the acoustics of the violin at the University of Wisconsin in 1965 and was featured on PBS' "Nova" show in 1982. His research has taken him to many states and countries abroad to lecture on his attempt to make a high quality but affordable violin. He has won the Hildale Award at the University of Wisconsin for his research work, was a Guggenheim Scholar and Fulbright Lecturer. He is listed in Who's Who and Who's Who in American Science. He served in World War II as a commissioned naval officer where he led the research of jamming devices for guided missiles and later oversaw researching German V-2 rockets. Jack's collection of scientific literature was donated to the Wisconsin University and is being placed on the internet. A bit of trivia: Jack built the first public address system in Carlisle for the school.

Jack Cooper graduated from CHS in **1963**, attended Dakota Wesleyan University with a degree in history and education. He continued at Missouri State and received a master's degree in secondary school administration, then later attended Drake to receive his K-12 guidance certificate. He was a ten-letter winner in football, wrestling and track at Dakota Wesleyan and was inducted into their Athletic Hall of Fame in 1996. He was selected as the Outstanding Young Religious Leader by the City of Ankeny in 1968. He was honored as a wrestling coach in 1986. He was a Carlisle Little League coach, flag football coach, helped organize the Tri-Community Coalition in Carlisle which focused on making the town drug-free. He also served as Sunday School teacher and Youth group leader. He also served on the scholarship committee for the CHS Alumni Association and served on the Carlisle Public Library Board. In addition to teaching and coaching, Jack served as a lay pastor for 19 years at the Bethel Chapel Christian Union Church. He was married to Charlene Tyler and had three children, Mark, Chad and Randy.

2000

John R. Smith graduated from Carlisle High School in **1923** then went on to graduate from Drake University. He was a good student and fine athlete. He earned his D letter playing baseball for Drake. He married in February 13, 1932. He was active in community affairs and organizations. He was a member of the Carlisle Christian Church, the Business Men's Club, The Masonic Lodge #368 and AF and AM of Carlisle and a past member of the Carlisle Lion's Club. He served on the Carlisle School Board and the Carlisle City Council for many years. He had a service station business for over 43 years (Smith's DX gas station). He sponsored many teams in many sports over the years. He was a former city hall golf champion and has bowled on several league championship teams. He was born July 16, 1904 and died August 5, 1976.

William R. Schooler, Sr. was born on July 4, 1923 in Hartford, Iowa to Guy and Helen Schooler. He attended grade school in Hartford and graduated from Carlisle High School in **1941**. Bill enlisted in the United States Navy during WWII and served in the South Pacific aboard the USS Allendale with the amphibious boat group, and aboard the USS Goshen as communication officer, signal officer and ship secretary. Bill graduated from Simpson College and the University of Wisconsin -School of Banking. In 1947 Bill married Joan J. Sylvester. They had one son William R. Schooler Jr. Bill and Joan enjoyed their hobby of genealogy. Bill worked for the Hartford-Carlisle Savings Bank for 45 Years, retiring in 1990 as President and Chairman of the Board. Bill served 5 years on the Carlisle City Council, 5 years on the Carlisle School Board and 10 years as Trustee and member of the corporate board of the Des Moines General Hospital. Bill was an Elder of the Community United Presbyterian Church in Hartford, Iowa, member of the Hartford Masonic Lodge, Scottish Rite Consistory and the Za-Ga-Zig Shrine. Avid local historian and created many written accounts of the Carlisle area history.

Earl (Corkey) Adamson, graduate of **1949**, was born in Valley Junction and had lived in Carlisle since 1946. He was an employee at Corkey's Cheese and Sandwich Shop in Indianola, Laser Works in Carlisle and Krispy Kreme Donuts in Des Moines. He had served in the Army Reserves and was a member of Carlisle Christian Church, where he was a deacon and Sunday School superintendent. He also belonged to Carlisle High School's athletic booster and music booster club, Warren County Historical Society, Honorary Indianola Lady Lions, Come Home to Carlisle Committee and Sesquicentennial Committee. He had served as a volunteer firefighter, a Cub Scout and Webelo leader, president of Dudley Questers, past president and director of Carlisle Alumni Association and president of Little League. He lived by the motto, "try giving yourself away." He was married Patricia; had three sons, Dennis of Ankeny, Doug of

West Des Moines and Duane of Indianola; a daughter, Dawn Golembiewski; eight grandchildren; and a great-grandchild.

Patricia Marsh Reynolds graduated in 1951 as the Class Valedictorian and served as Homecoming Queen. She married and had 3 children, John, Mike and Susan, all graduates of CHS. She was active in the church and community while living in Palmyra and raising her children. Her knowledge of antique collecting led her to the Carlisle Questers organization. Serving for many years on the Alumni Board as historian included collecting and organizing our memorabilia, and storing it in her home for years until we were granted storage at the school. After moving into Carlisle into her family home, she dived into her artistic side in tole painting and created a meticulous showcase flower garden and yard. She became very active in her church while also making a sizable contribution to the restoration of the Palmyra Historical Church.

Judy Bruce Russell graduated with the Class of **1971**. In high school she served on the Student Council and was President of the FHA chapter and Co-President of FTA. She attended Morningside College, double majoring in Elementary Education and Library Science. There, she was on the board of the SISEA organization. She was invited to present at several State Librarian Conventions and was the recipient of the AASL Technology Information Award at the National Librarians Convention in Chicago. In her community, she was active in her church as a Sunday School teacher, Bible School teacher and Youth Group leader. She created the Summer Day Camp program at the Family Life Center. She was one of the co-founders of the Tri-Community Coalition and which placed signs around Carlisle to help keep the schools' drug-free. She also ran the school concession stands and Little League concessions. She was awarded the Warren County Volunteer of the Year Award by Governor Branstad. Her work with the CHS Alumni Association began in 1994. She served as secretary, President, and treasurer. She built the website, archived the records, and developed the spreadsheet for all alumni donation accounts for the Honor Roll. She has led the fundraising events for scholarships which grew from five to twenty-five during her Presidency. She is extremely proud of her three children Michael, Barbara and Jill and seven grandchildren. She retired and now lives on her family farm, first founded in 1861.

He was the finance chairman of Middle River Friends Church, President of Island school Board, President of the Carlisle school board, President of Wm. Gerald had a wide reputation as an athlete, remembered for (among other things) hitting a softball from the batter's box into Sam Nickle's yard.

He was a member of the City Council, President of the Carlisle Business Men's Assn., Chamber of Commerce, member of the CHS Alumni Assn., Lion's Club, Carlisle Methodist Church, Library Board and many other groups and committees. Ed lived, worked, served and worshipped in Carlisle for nearly 89 years. He and wife Wilma (school nurse) strived to make Carlisle a better community for today and the future. He was a friend and confidant to all.

Glen (Red) Crum graduated from Carlisle in **1943**, married Diane Smith and has two children, Glenda and Dan. All graduated from CHS. Red was an accomplished musician on both the piano and saxophone. He shared this talent with many people through the years. Other church activities include: Funeral dinners, the 4th of July Committee, and Harvest Dinner fundraisers. She also presented many, many talks in the community about her family's collection of Native American artifacts. She was well-known in the state for her work in 4-H at the local, Warren County level and was the State Fair 4-H Building Coordinator.

Bob Betzer graduated from CHS in **1961**. He was a wise rehabilitator. He purchased old and abandoned properties and renovated them for renewed use in the Carlisle downtown area. He worked diligently to preserve much of the Carlisle history, seeking and finding lost information. He accumulated photos, artifacts and stories about early Carlisle. He also served as a volunteer fireman, on the City Council for

eight years, and treasurer of the alumni association for 10 years. He co-chaired two historical and antique shows celebrating Carlisle. He received this honor posthumously, after years of giving his time and energy to make both the alumni association and the town of Carlisle a better place.

Mark Mills graduated in **1972**. He then attended the University of Iowa, graduating in 1976. He received a Master's Degree in Journalism from the University of Maryland, then a Master's Degree in English from St. Cloud State University in Minnesota. He served as Bureau Chief for Newslink in Washington, D.C. He had a book published in 2003, inspired by the missing Johnny Gosch. He became a professor at St. Cloud University and served as chairman of the Mass Communications Department. Mark and his wife had three sons, then adopted a Korean baby. A few years later they adopted three children from Peru, South America. Mark coached football for ethnic minority students for seven years, and bought their required equipment. He also most graciously, helped his graduates be placed as news anchors.

Received medical training, graduated from Iowa State University, then received his medical degree from Des Moines Osteopathic Medical Center. He has served on the Carlisle School Board, Alumni Board as President and the Carlisle Historical Society board.

He later acquired a double masters degree in Business Administration and Health Administration while being employed full-time as pharmacist at Iowa City V.A.M.C. This program was used in local nursing homes. He remains active in community and church activities and served on a Task Force pharmacy group.

Jerry Triplett graduated in **1953**. Jerry attended Drake University after graduating from CHS where he earned a Masters Degree and attended the Seminary. He worked as a guidance counselor at Winterset High School and while also serving as the minister at the Avon Community Church. Jerry ran in the Boston Marathon and continued to run 10-15 miles per day up to age 76. He participated in Community Theater, volunteered to help the elderly, served meals on wheels, would often perform for them, including dressing up as Uncle Sam in various parades. Uncle Sam also ventured into school classrooms and across the state on his bike as he visited all county seats. He also rode his bike from the West coast to the East coast in 1992.

Gary Sinclair graduated in 1969, then attended Simpson College majoring in Economics and Physical Education, graduating Cum Laude. He received his Master of Arts degree from Iowa State University in School Administration, specializing in School Superintendent. After teaching and coaching in Carlisle, he served as Principal and Superintendent in Garwin, Van Meter and Dallas Center-Grimes schools. He was named Superintendent of the Year in 2010, was honored in 2005 in the Walt Whitman Club, and was
