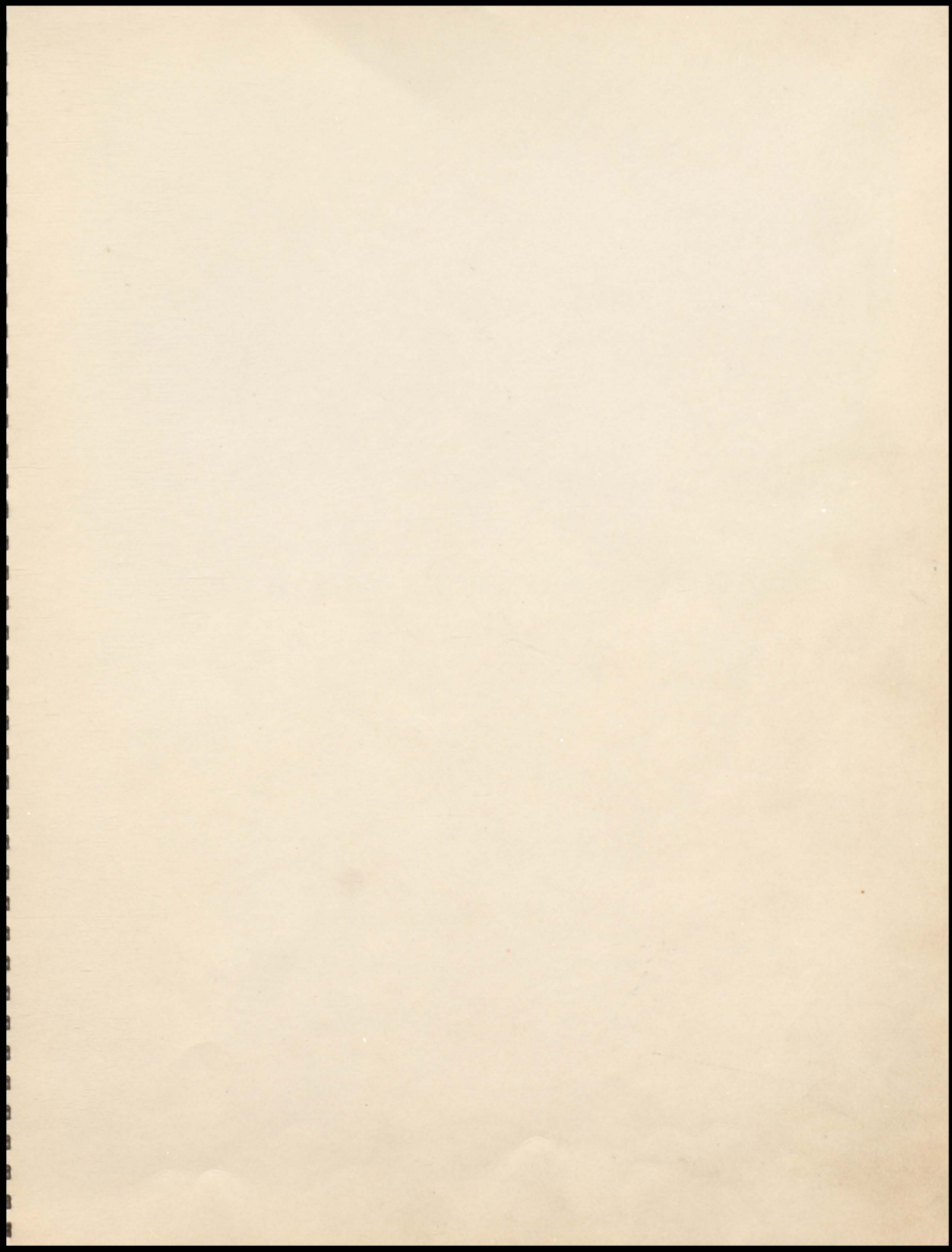

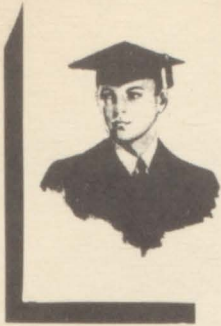

CLASS HISTORY
