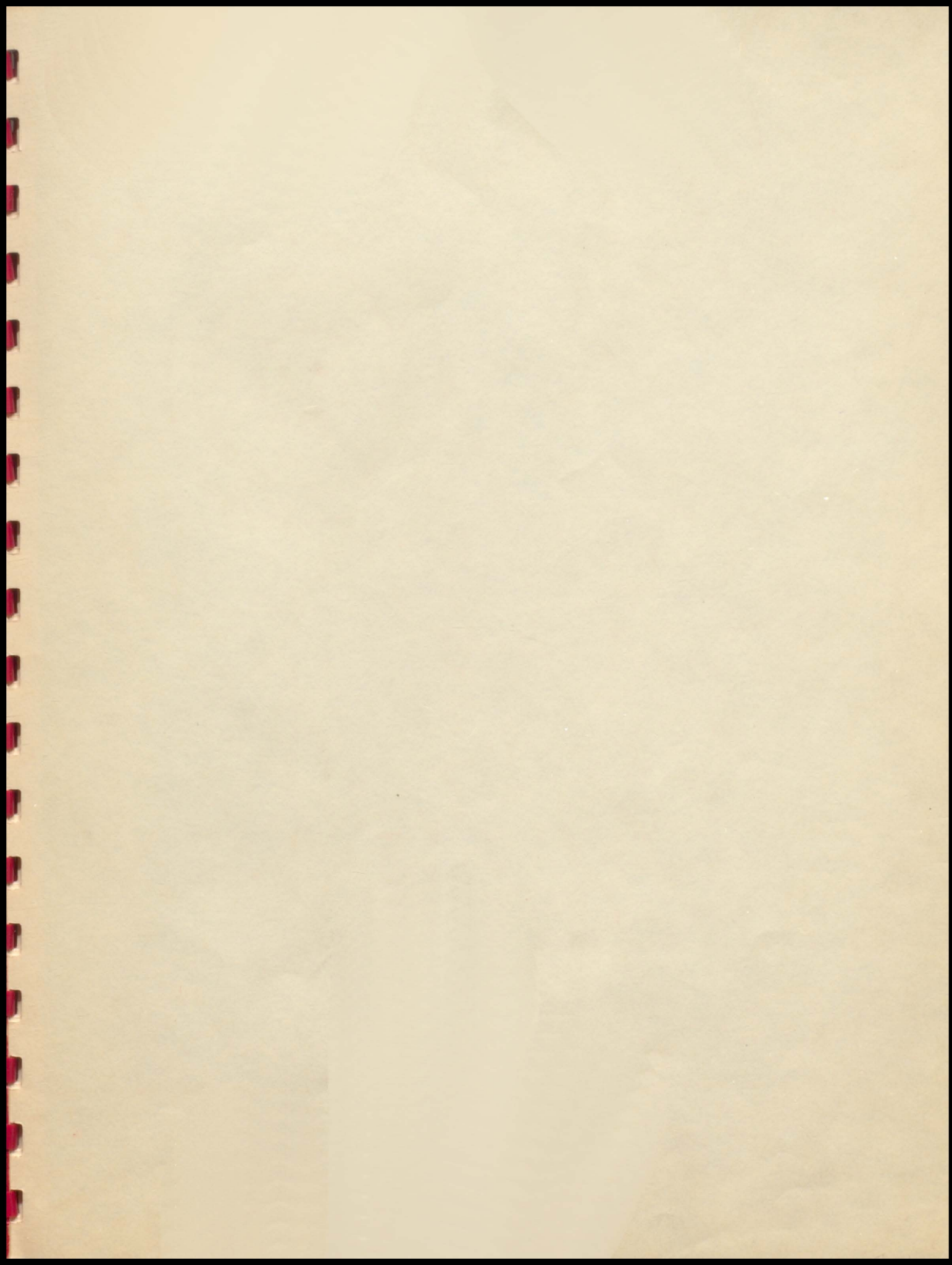

OUR LIBRARY

In 1941, Grant Randleman, a very generous man, who lived in the Carlisle School district, died. He left his entire estate to the Carlisle Independent School to be used as a fund for establishing and maintaining a school library. The Board of Education gratefully accepted. When the estate was finally settled, it was found that the school was to receive about \$20,000. According to his will, one-half of this amount was to be expended to establish the library and purchase suitable books for all grade and high school students. The other half was to be invested in such a manner that its income would maintain the library and add new books each year.

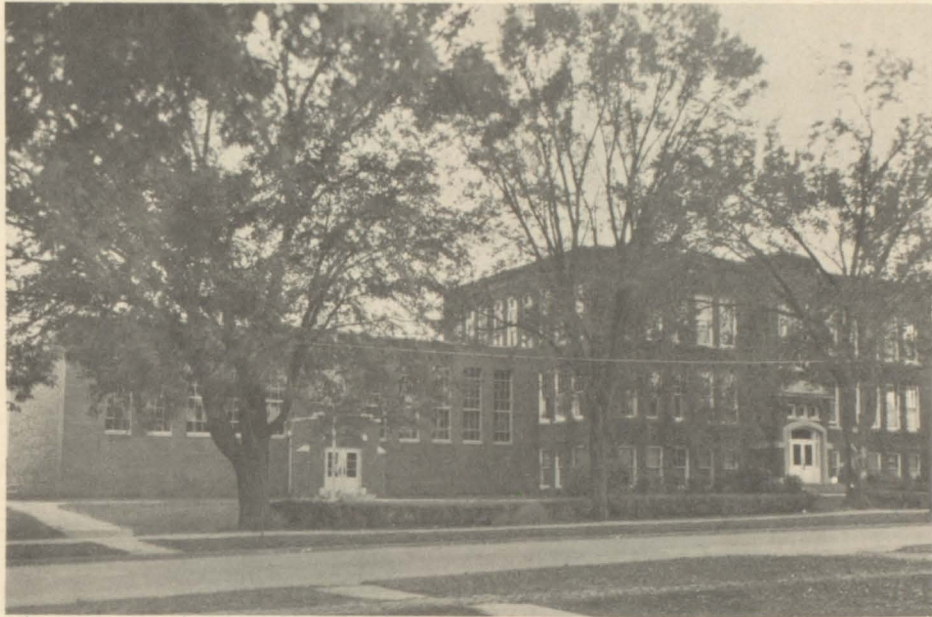
The old library, with a collection of 445 books, was originally in the north half of what is now the typing room. Since this room was entirely too small to accommodate a large number of books, it was moved down stairs. It then consisted of the west room of the present-day library. The first year, over six hundred and fifty dollars was spent on new books. Each year after that, from three to four hundred dollars has been used for this purpose. In 1943, the room had to be enlarged for the second time by making a doorway into the adjoining room. This made room for the ever-increasing number of books and created a more pleasant atmosphere for the students who study there.

The Randleman Memorial Library, which is the proper name for it, has had three librarians. Mrs. Lorene Fleming Kline was librarian from 1933 to 1938; Miss Helen Petre from 1938 to 1940; and Mrs. Faye Sours has been here since 1940.

The library purchases one new set of encyclopedias each year and subscribes to about thirty different magazines. Any student, simply by going to the library, has access to all types of reading material. An arrangement has been worked out whereby grade students have library days on Tuesdays and Thursdays; high school students, on Mondays, Wednesdays, and Fridays.

We, students of Carlisle High, realize that most small schools are not so fortunate as to have a library as fine as ours. We are deeply indebted to the donor of the library and to Mrs. Sours for assisting us in our education.

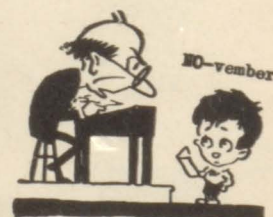

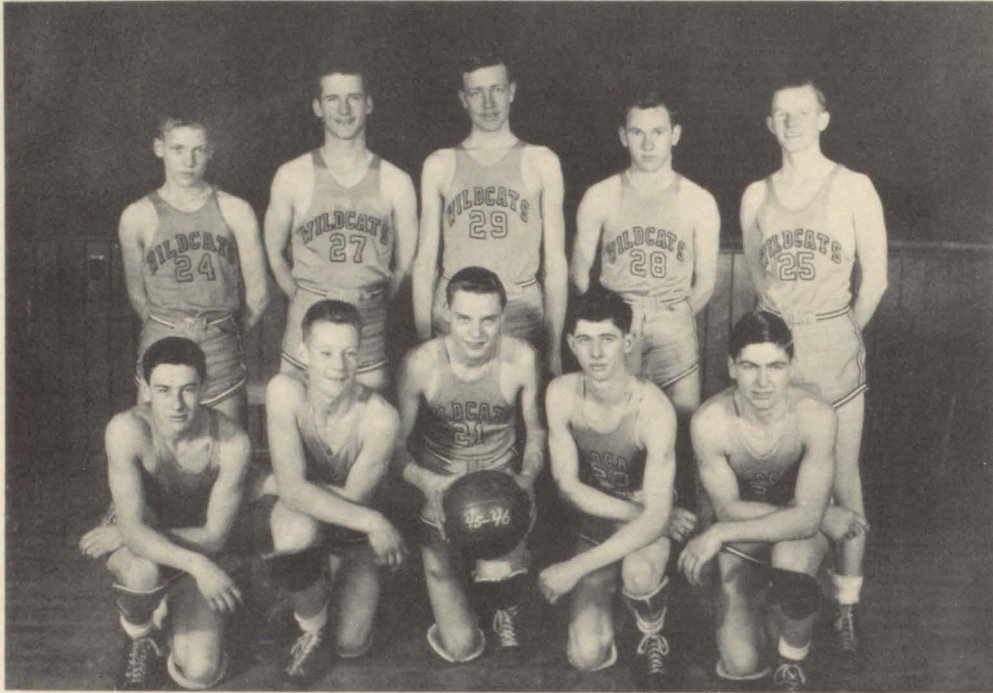
Practice was very vigorous during the early part of the season. The girls vowed then to participate in the state tournament. Our opening game was an exhibition affair with Slater, November 2, played on the Valley High floor, with Carlisle winning 32-27. We also took part in the Girls Rules Clinic held at Allerton, November 9, where we were defeated by Allerton 45-44 in a hard fought game. In the newly organized Po-Wa-Ma Conference, we played Milo on our floor, for the first conference victory of the season.

The results of the County Tournament were rather disappointing to the team and followers, as we were "doped" to win. We dropped our semi-final game to Norwalk by 27-28. This defeat spurred the team to play better ball and win the Sectional Tournament, held on our floor.

The District Tournament was held on our floor February 22 and 23. Four teams were in the tournament--Rhodes, Melbourne, Monroe, and Carlisle. We won the district by defeating Rhodes and Monroe in two very close games.

This is the first time that Carlisle has earned the right to play in the state tournament, and the entire community is very proud of its team. Our first game is with Steamboat Rock March 13.

J. B. ANDERSON



J. B. Anderson, a veteran of nineteen and one-half years of school-bus hauling, has been accredited with 120,000 miles of driving; nearly five times around the globe.

For the first four years he drove a Model T cab with a home-made body and received a monthly salary of fifty dollars. His average load consisted of from twelve to sixteen on this fourteen passenger bus, though at times he has carried as many as twenty-one pupils.

A Model A cab and a body purchased from Jesse Marsh, sufficed his next fifteen years. On this route his mileage averaged between twelve and eighteen miles a day.

In his last half year, he drove a thirty passenger Chevrolet bus

and his mileage increased to fifty miles a day.

Mr. Anderson's route is the youngest of the three now existing, but he has served the community in this line longer than any of the preceding drivers. His record shows that he has practiced the policy of delivering the pupils to school on time, safely. In all his term he has had no accidents and has been late to school only four times.
