A four year veteran of Carlisle High, Wayne Prall closed his last fall season with 50 strike outs, while Brockett, a one year rookie infielder and two years behind the batter was credited with 37 strike outs.

The Sectional Tournament taking place at Liberty Center was composed of three games, which Carlisle played all three, winning by a margin of 53 to 1. Veteran pitcher, Wayne Prall, pitching 12 innings and catching 9 while veteran catcher Brockett pitched.

The first game, Sept. 25, against Liberty Center was started off by a walk by Rex Pegram, & Harold Stewart followed by getting on base on an error, by which both scored. Through the entire game Carlisle made 11 hits for 22 runs, while Liberty Center made no hits and no runs.

The second game played the 27th was with Milo in which they fell 14-0. It looked rather grim to start off with, as R. Pegram struck out, Stewart flyed out & W. Prall struck out. Carlisle took the field, threw out the first man & struck out the next two. Second inning & not a run for either side. Brockett steps up to bat and hits a 3 base Texas Leager into right field, which started a rally of 9 points that inning, followed by 5 others throughout the game.

The third game the following day with Leroy which was started off by R. Pegram with a single & followed by 9 other hits to score 17 points throughout the game, while W. Prall allowed no hits, and only

one run by an infield error.
